MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF OF POLICE

Dear Mayor and City Council Members:

2024 was an eventful year for the Windom Police Department. We were short of staff for a good portion of the year, reorganized our command structure and responded to the flood that impacted our community in June.

Officers Daniel Gardiner and Ethan Palmer were hired to fill existing positions within the department. Both are 2024 graduates of Worthington Community College's Law Enforcement program. Our agency operated with seven officers for most of the year until both new employees completed training. All staff put in extra hours to keep our community safe.

Assistant Chief Cory Hillesheim resigned from our department after 14 years of service. He accepted employment in the private sector. We reorganized our administrative staff to have a daytime and nighttime sergeant. Investigator Donna Marcy was promoted to Sergeant and supervises the daytime shift and Sergeant Devin Kopperud supervises the night shift.

Windom Officers also assisted with the flood that struck our community in 2024. Several members of our department suffered damage to their homes and still worked while our community was dealing with the disaster. I am proud of our town and our department in their response to the flood.

I want to thank the Windom Mayor and City Council Members for their continued support. I would also like to thank SRO Dana Wallace, Records Clerk Deb Nesseth and Sergeant Devin Kopperud for their efforts in creating this report.

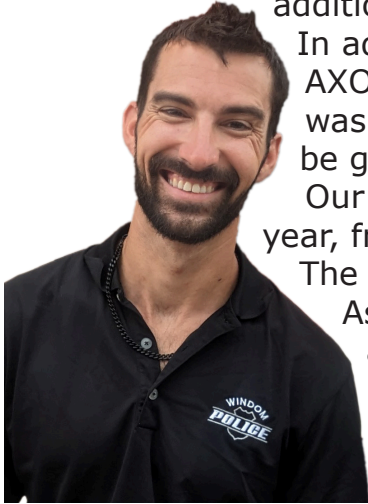
Why did the chicken cross the road?

The year 2024 brought several changes for our department. We welcomed two new officers, Officer Gardiner and Officer Palmer, both who proved to be great additions to the department.



In addition, we have invested in new, updated Taser's, as well as AXON squad and body worn cameras, replacing equipment that was at the end of their service life. The new camera systems will be going live in 2025.

Our Drone program had multiple requests for assistance this year, frequently assisting other agencies in locating individuals.

The HEAT team had a busy year, responding to 17 call-outs.

As always, it has been an honor to serve the City of Windom and look forward to the new year.

SERGEANT DEVIN KOPPERUD

2024 was a busy year for the Police Department. We fought through staffing shortages, flooding, and a lot of busy calls. However, in the end, I felt like it made us closer, and we learned to work well as a team. I feel like our ability to work well with each other will drive us to be more successful in the coming year.

This year was quite memorable. We welcomed 2 new officers to the PD. I feel like Officer Gardiner and Officer Palmer are a great addition and I wish them success in this career.

I was offered the opportunity to become an ALICE instructor. This is a vital tool, with the increase in violence in the United States. The concept that I like most about ALICE is that it is not just teaching people how to increase their survivability in a critical incident, but it hopefully helps them feel empowered to teach others around them the techniques that they learn.

I also had the opportunity to work with Officer Lasky on developing a new use of force course that utilizes the PD's MILO range. This is an important training. As it



gives us a safe environment to train for incidents that require us to make split second decisions while in the course of our duties.

I got to witness firsthand how well the PD works as a team. In April, we were able to successfully locate a missing juvenile that had been missing for several weeks. It was a team effort that resulted in the juvenile being found safe.

Unfortunately, to end the year, we had to deal with a heartbreaking loss of life, as the PD is investigating a homicide that

took place minutes before the new year. However, we worked hard and were able to apprehend the suspect within minutes. We were assisted by other agencies such as the Cottonwood County Sheriff's Office, Mountain Lake Police, Minnesota State Patrol, Jackson County Sheriff's Office, and Windom Ambulance.

I learned that all the agencies in the County and surrounding area have each other's backs, and it makes me feel proud to work alongside them and everyone at the Police Department. I truly believe that our cooperation with each other is how we will remain successful in serving our community.

INVESTIGATOR REPORT

Another year has flown by. Unfortunately, 2024 came to a close with yet another murder at the Phat Pheasant Pub. This murder, and assault of 2 additional people inside the Phat Pheasant Pub, has made the start of 2025 very busy. (The first 9-1-1 calls came into Cottonwood Dispatch at 11:48 pm on 12-31-24).

I am very fortunate that the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension (MN BCA) has once again come to Windom to provide assistance. The County Attorney's Office has also asked the Minnesota Attorney General's Office for assistance with charging this case. The Attorney from the AG's office is the same Attorney I worked with on a previous murder. These connections are so valuable, and it is always great to see a familiar face when working a difficult case on little sleep!

2024 had many felony level cases. In the past, I have highlighted most of the major cases in which I was involved. This year, I wanted to highlight sex crimes.

In 2022, a 13-year-old girl was sexually assaulted at the BARC building in Windom. This was a case of "who done it?" Now that the case is through the court system, I can give some details.

The initial report was from a concerned citizen. This citizen waited 18 days to report to Family Services (not Law Enforcement) behavior she saw at the BARC that seemed out of place. It was after this concerned citizen received a letter from family services that her report was screened out and she then came to Law Enforcement.

The initial report was that a Hispanic girl, and a Hispanic male were seen in the costume room at the BARC. The girl appeared to be naked waist down. The male had a towel around his waist.

Who did it? And What was done? Is there even a crime? Twenty-six days had passed since this incident occurred. There was no evidence. The deck was stacked for an unsuccessful outcome.

Eventually, I was able to identify the victim, who was forcefully penetrated by an unknown Hispanic male. It took time, but the male was located. FINALLY, in 2024, the 27-year-old male suspect was tried in Cottonwood County Court for Felony 1st degree criminal sexual conduct. There was a Jury trial held at the end of August.

In January 2025, He was **sentenced to 24 years in prison**. Justice was served. Each and every member of the Jury deserves a huge THANK YOU! Thank you for your time, attention, and verdict. This is a case that never should have happened. Our children should never be prey to child predators. To the victim, and her family, you will always be in my prayers and hold a special place in my heart.

In closing, I am feeling the great loss of Cottonwood County Attorney Nicholas Anderson. Attorney Anderson started his career just before me...some 20 + years ago. Attorney Anderson mentored 2 great assistant attorney's, Kristi Meyeraan and Casey Schofeld-Mork. These 3 attorneys and I worked very closely together. Although we may not have always agreed with each other, we could agree to disagree and the mutual respect we gave each other grew our relationships even deeper. I greatly miss Nick, Kristi, and Casey.

Thank you for helping me to be the best Investigator I can be. All your suggestions and critiques are invaluable. When we can work together, as a team, to provide justice for victims there is nothing greater. Thank you for your hard work and service to the citizens of Cottonwood County, and more specifically, Windom!

Criminal Sexual Conduct Crimes in 2024

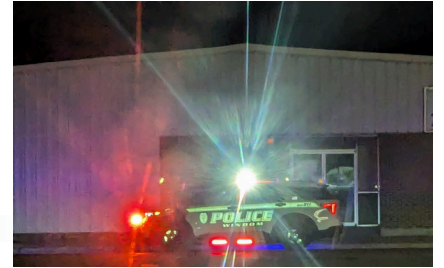
Feb – a 54-year-old male was charged with 1 count of 4th degree criminal sexual conduct; contact uses coercion and false imprisonment with intentional restraint for his action against a 26 year old female.

April – a 18 year old male was charged with 1 count of 2nd degree criminal sexual conduct. The victim is under 14 years of age.

July – 56-year-old male was charged with 2 counts of 1st degree criminal sexual conduct. The victim is mentally impaired and/or physically helpless. The victim is a 45-year-old female.

September - 15-year-old male was charged with 2 counts of 5th degree non-consensual sexual conduct. His victim is a 14-year-old female.

October – 41-year-old male was charged with 3rd degree criminal sexual conduct position of authority, 5th degree criminal sexual conduct, non-consensual and tattooing an individual under 18 years of age. The victim is a 17-year-old female.

RECORDS AND STATS

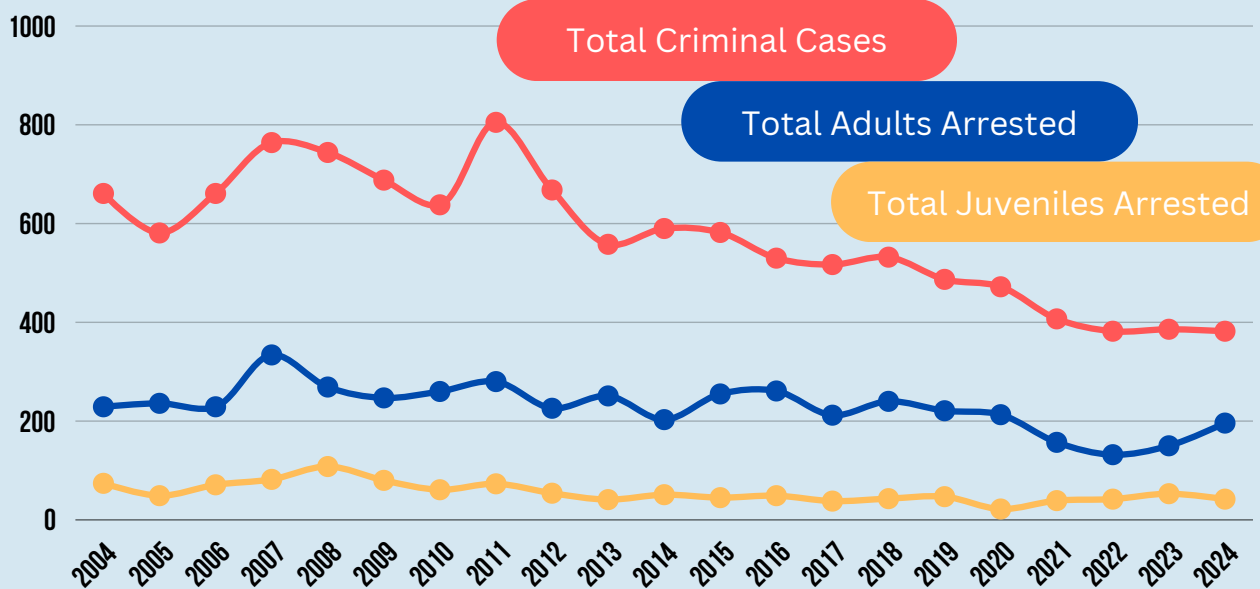
Records Management in 2024 didn't see too many changes. The Police activity including calls for service and criminal cases were down, but the adult arrests were up, which is a reflection of hard work and excellent investigations.

The highlights for myself in records management were less noteworthy in comparison to another significant change in my workday, with the resignation by our Assistant Chief Cory Hillesheim the end of March, 2024. Cory was a very dedicated Police Officer/ Assistant Chief throughout his 14 ½ year career with the Windom Police Department. He had a strong work ethic and high standards that garnered respect and support from his co-workers. Cory has chosen a different career path and is already doing very well. I wish him the very best in what the future holds for him and his family.

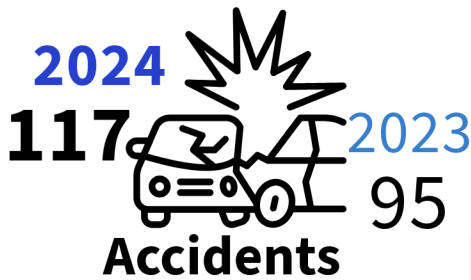
In records we are preparing to implement the BCA Minnesota Clean Slate Act. The new law requires automatic expungement (sealing) of certain records from a person's BCA criminal history, eliminating the need, in most instances, to petition the court for an order expunging the record. This law went into effect on Jan. 1st, but agencies will not need to take any action for a few months. The Clean Slate Act differs from the Adult Use Cannabis Act, which went into effect 8/1/23. We were notified from BCA in June, 2024 of certain records that required expungement in 2024, and will be notified again in 2025 of additional records. These expungements are handled through the guidance of our County Attorney, to determine how to carry out sealing of our own records.

20 YEAR OF CASES AND ARRESTS



The term arrest is often synonymous with an individual being placed in handcuffs and transported to jail. This is referred to as a physical arrest. In lieu of jail, an arrest could also be adjudicated through a citation or a Notice to Appear (NTA). This is essentially an alleged offender's promise to appear if summoned by the court.
